A great result for Mike, Ian and Simon in their first regional competition but the experience of John, Ged and Ann was too much for them on this occasion but watch out for them next year!



The plate competition was won by Peter Smith, John and Rose Thatcher of Ottery St Mary.

SINGLES CHAMPION



The Singles Championship was held at ISCA PC on 10th September with a disappointing entry of only 8 players. However, those who did enter enjoyed some tough matches with Lesley Drakatos beating John Thatcher in the final match of the day which co-incidentally decided the day. Lesley scored 13 to John's 11. Henry Pickett was the runner up because he beat John earlier in the day.

DEVON DOUBLES CHAMPIONS



The Doubles Championship took place on 13th August at Ottery St Mary and the home advantage certainly helped John and Rose Thatcher beating Chris Rendle and Rosemary Earl 13 - 3 in the Championship final while Peter and Sue Smith managed to hold off the challenge of Mike Anderson and Simon Rapsey from the Pig on the Hill by 13 - 7 in the plate final.

REGIONAL MATCHES

This is the toughest tournament we play in with 12 games over 2 days on very different surfaces, unlike anything we have in Devon. If we could provide another 4 teams we could compete in Division 2 of the actual championship rather than the Challenge tournament. It would be a tough event but we would all benefit from playing at a higher level.

Although the weather recently has led to a few sessions and events being rained off, when it has been fine Plymouth Petanque has continued to flourish.

Our regular social sessions on Sundays and Wednesdays still attract an average of around 30 players. An hour's play is followed by tea and biscuits (and quite often cake) and then we hit the pistes again for up to another hour's play.

Our Devon League team put on a good show this season and were very happy to have continued their steady progress up the ladder each year.

Each summer we hold a charity event to support a local charity close to our home site in Devonport. This involves a silly theme for the afternoon which this year was hat related. Although the charity part of the event only happens during the tea break of a normal pétanque session this year we raised an amazing £900 which we have donated to the Devonport Live Cafe. This is a non-profit making establishment that concentrates on supporting local people, especially those who are homeless and/or isolated or just down on their luck at the moment.



There is a single piste built by the city council at the local Devonport Park which has lain unused for

quite a few years. One of our members who lives close by has taken it upon himself to resurrect it and keep it in good order. Many of our members have recently taken to playing up there in small groups on days other than our club sessions which, as the piste is in full view of the users of this very beautiful and popular park, is helping to popularise the game locally. Actually, the game is getting so popular up in the park now that there is a proposal to add a second piste.

In the winter months we are playing a winter league on one Sunday in the month, working with the Pig so as both venues are used. It is a fun event, with some rules as there is a big prize for the winners (believe the provision of a big prize and you would believe anything!!). Maximum entries are 16 teams (pairs), substitutes are allowed if you cannot make one or more of the fixed dates.
